Charles D Kimball-One of our oldest and most liked shipmates, "Charlie" Kimball deployed on Eternal Patrol on 12 July 2023 in Rochester, NH. Growing up in the family home on Sandown Road, he attended the Ellis school and graduated from Sanborn Seminary in Kingston. He enlisted in the Navy in 1953, and volunteered immediately for submarine service. He served aboard the PICUDA (SS382), the SEA WOLF (SSN575) the SCORPION(SSN 589), the GEORGE WASHINGTON (SSBN598). Charlie served on the BANG(SS385) his qual boat from 1953-1955. He retired from the Navy as an EMC in 1973. If you are driving to Providence, you'll be on RTE. 95. Take Exit 28B, you will then be on East Ave. (RTE. 113), take the right onto Greenwich Ave. And then a right on Crossings BLVD, which leads you to the entrance.

Remember the hotel has an indoor pool, so bring a bathing suit or two.

Paul tells me that the Hospitality room will be open on Sunday for the early birds. If you arrive early, I'm sure Paul would appreciate any help in setting up, he said he'd buy all those a drink afterwords. Ha Ha!
