





Editor's Notes and Ramble: Hi Shipmates! I just returned from 7 days of special ops in the Carribbean aboard a huge target. Enjoyed the cruise but now find myself rushing to get this Newsletter out to you. Bad planning on my part.

This year has brought us a lot of sorrow with so many of our shipmates leaving us for Eternal Patrol. And, I regret to say that the sadness continues.



Joe Champ was an original Plank Owner who helped commission BANG in 1943 Portsmouth, NH, guided her to the Pacific Theater during WWII, stayed aboard for all six of her war patrols, and then guided her back to Portsmouth, NH. Shortly thereafter he left her. Sound familiar? Well it should as I said basically the same thing two issues ago about Joe Hutchins. In fact,

everything I said about Joe Hutchins applies to Joe Champ also. Two fine gentlemen who had a job to do—and did it. The only wording that needs to be updated is the number of Originals we still have on our mailing list. That number is now 17 with only 2 serving all six patrols. Joe's widow **Mildred** mailed the following to me:

Sending a note to advise that my husband, Joseph Champ died on Thursday, September 7, 2006. He struggled with lung cancer from March until his death.

He served on the USS Bang from 1943—1945, including all six of her war patrols in the Pacific.

We attended several BANG Reunions. It was great to meet old friends of Joe's and take part in the activities.

We always looked forward to receiving the 'Bang Gang Newsletters' and as everyone has said—you do a great service to the BANG Submariners.

I am enclosing Joe's obituary in case you want to mention something in the Newsletter. Also enclosing a donation to the Slush Fund in Joe's memory.

**Joseph W. "Bud" Champ**, 85, of the Sanatoga Ridge Community, Lower Pottsgrove, went home to be with his Saviour on Thursday, Sept. 7, 2006, and died at home with his family at his side. Formerly of Cedars, he was the husband of 63 years to Mildred (Garis)

Champ.

Born Feb. 20, 1921, in Philadelphia, he was a son of the late Joseph and Ella Mae (Tomlinson) Champ. He was a graduate of The Williamson Free School of Mechanical Trades in Media, Class of 1940 in the Brick-Masonry Program. Mr. Champ was a veteran of World War II, serving in the U.S. Naval Submarine Service on the U.S.S. "Bang" for six patrols in the South Pacific.

Mr. Champ was retired from the James Hamilton Construction Co. of West Chester and the Haverstick-Borthwick Co. of Plymouth Meeting. He was an active member of First Presbyterian Church at Airy & DeKalb St., Norristown, where he served as a Sunday School Teacher, Deacon, Trustee and Elder.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Amy Roye (David) Fraschetta of King of Prussia and Kristine Holly (Alan) Beck of Yerington, Nev.; a son, Dale Timothy (Joy) Champ of Millstone, N.J.; five grandchildren: Jason Beck and Holly Beck Holst of Reno, Nev., Tim Beck of San Diego, Calif., Megan and Scott Champ of Millstone, N.J.; three greatgranddaughters; a stepgreat-grandson; several nephews and a niece. He was preceded in death by a sister, Anne Champ, and brother, James Champ.

'Whitie' Seth Henderson arrived aboard BANG December 1944 from Division 202 Relief Crew. He aboard for BANG's final two war patrols and then rode her back to Portsmouth, NH. Whitie continued to stay aboard BANG for another year before transferring to Spinax (SS489). Though he missed the first four of BANG's Patrols, I consider him no less a hero than the rest of his WWII shipmates and, like all BANG shipmates, we who survive mourn his passing.

Whitie's son Dana sent me the following:

My father passed away late last month (October). He was a submariner and very proud of his service in both WWII and Korea. I am enclosing information regarding him and hope you will publish it in your next Newsletter.

YOUNTVILLE - S. P. "Whitie" Henderson died on Wednesday, Oct. 25, 2006, in Yountville. He was 80 years old. He was born on Nov. 4, 1925.

Born and raised in Highland Park, Los Angeles, he graduated from Franklin High School and entered the U.S.N. Submarine Service in 1942. During his tour of duty as a radioman on the U.S.S. Bang, he had an opportunity to show outstanding courage by rescuing a downed fighter pilot in open water in the South Pacific. He also had employment history with the United Parcel Service, and in business equipment and television/movie industry video sales.

Later, while stationed at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in Maine, he met the girl of his dreams at a U.S.O. dance and they married on Sept. 8, 1945. He convinced her to move from New England to Southern California, where they began their lives together and started a family. He was recalled to active duty during the Korean conflict and then returned to the Los Angeles area upon being discharged.

Whitie began his career working in the television and movie industry where he met and worked with many famous people. During this time, he was active in the Optomist International and spent a term as lieutenant governor of the organization.

He was a very positive, outgoing person who made good friends easily. Eventually, he and "Kay" settled between Palm Desert and the Napa Valley/Yountville area. Golf and his newest pleasure, bocce ball, continued to introduce him to great friends and fulfill his joy of friendly competition.

He died comforted by the thoughts of his most wonderful friends and his family.

Whitie is survived by his wife, Kathleen (McLaughlin) Henderson; son, Dana Henderson of Napa; daughter, Heidi Juarado of Caldwell, Idaho; sister, June Ross of Glendale; grandchildren, Cory and Ashley Dawson, Kristen Brown, Sean Henderson, Amy Kincaide; four great-grandchildren; and many extended family members throughout Southern California. He was predeceased by his parents, Theodore and Uarda Henderson. No services will be held.

**Neil Jones** reported to BANG 2/21/57 and transferred to Halfbeak (SS352) on 9/16/58. He was in attendance at most of our Reunions and helped host our 2001 Reunion in Mystic.

In trying to describe Neil, the word 'unique' keeps coming to mind. You never knew what to expect him to say or do next. His whole life seemed to be run on spur-of-the-moment decisions. He was always

thinking to keep one step ahead.

And, like the way he lived his life, Neil's death was no different. He just did it. The month before Neil's son called me to report the sad news, I received a call from Neil requesting I send him a ballcap because he lost all of his hair to chemo. He joked about changing his name to Kojack and mentioned the up-coming reunion at Albuquerque. Like in the past, I expected him to show up any second.

The following obituary was found in a NJ newspaper. And, to reiterate Neil's uniqueness, please read the last paragraph. According to his son, this was Neil's death wish.

**Neil Jones**, 68, of Dayton died Wednesday, Oct. 18, 2006, at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, New Brunswick.

Born in New York, he resided in Queens and Long Island before moving to Dayton three years ago. Mr. Jones was a member of South Brunswick Senior Center, where he served as a ranger and held a position on the advisory board. He was a Navy veteran of the Korean War and served on the USS Bang SS385.

Son of the late Cornelius and Mary Jones, he is survived by a son and a daughter-in-law, Neil and Laura Jones of East Stroudsburg, PA; a daughter and son-in-law, Nora and Tony Zaccaria of Oceanside, CA; a sister, Catherine Donohue of FL, and a granddaughter, Jessica Rose Zaccaria.

Burial was at Brigadier General William C. Doyle Veterans Memorial Cemetery, Arneytown.

I was still aboard BANG when he arrived but we were in the Philly Yards at the time for a battery change so I don't think we saw much of each other during the

Now I was aboard during that operation but have no idea what went on topside as I was either down in the galley serving you guys gourmet delights or over at the 'Club Bermadu' getting myself in shape to prepare the next one. Maybe this will ring a bell with some of you Techs. And, if it does, contact him. I'm sure he will be happy to hear from you.

Hello all; I am wondering if any of you might have been on BANG in January 1957. That month BANG operated out of Bermuda carrying three engineers and a technician from Bell Labs for demonstration trials of the Demon Lofar classification system that was later to become the BQQ-3 classification sonar for the nuclear sub fleet.

For these tests a linear array was installed in the superstructure forward of the sail. BANG consistently detected and classified a target sub at ranges in excess of 100 miles.

I was one of the BTL engineers and I would like to refresh my memory of this trip with some one who might have been on the boat at that time.

The BANG trial followed R & D that had been conducted a few years earlier on the CAVALLA. You can find more on this by going to CAVALLA's web page, or to Google, and clicking on "Civilian Submariner."

**Lloyd Foglesong**, a MotorMachinistMate (43-44, WP1,2,3), "I went into the Navy November 7, 1939 with my brother Leo, who ended up on the carrier Saratoga and he stayed in for 30 years. I signed up for 6 years. When we got back to New London after the war ended my wife wanted me to get out of the Navy and go home to Nebraska where we had a little girl who was born July 25, 1944.

In 1940 me and my brother were on a 4 stack destroyer that was one of 50 slated to be leased to the British when they asked for volunteers for Submarine duty. Out of 450 only 4 of us passed the test and went to New London. Two of us reported to the Base, one to the Tender USS Beaver AS-5, and I was sent to the R-7, R-9, R-15 detail to recommission them. My brother rode the destroyer to Nova Scotia to train the British sailors how to operate it. He then left for the Saratoga and spent all of the war aboard her becoming a Boiler Tender Chief.

I had two good teachers aboard the 'R' Boats. A 16 yr vet MM from Kansas who got called back in and George Shadix, a 12 yr vet from Alabama, who taught me all about the big Nelseco engine. After the war I ran into George again as he was manager of the Chief's Club on the Sub Base at New London. After visiting him a few times, I hear that he and his girlfriend ran off to Canada with thousands of dollars of the Club's money. The last I heard he was locked up in Portsmouth, NH where I put BANG in commission in 1943. I doubt that he is still there as he must be close to 100 by now. I was 87 in October and my sis gave me a big dinner at her home with a couple nieces and friends.

We had no tools at first and we used a long bent chisel and a sledge hammer to tighten the nuts on the 1" bolts that held the piston liner down and used navy white line to compress the piston rings so we could let the pistons down. Later the Base machine shop made us some open end wrenches to use.

We wore coveralls over our dungarees and when they got full of grease and dirt we would put them in a big oil drum on the dock, poured boiler compound on them, and then inserted a steam line to clean them. We would then hang them in the engine room to dry.

As you know, most of the best skippers of WWII Boats were trained on the 'R' and 'S' Boats. I had three CO's who all went to new construction before I did. I stayed on the 'R' Boats for 3 years training others for new construction. Here are a few incidents that happened during that time.

We went to Bermuda and there was a French submarine tied up that never left the dock. It had its fresh water tanks full of wine and its sailors would sit topside and drink all day long.

In Guantanamo Bay there was a Russian Sub with a

half women crew who were bigger than their short, stocky counterparts and did the same work as them. In St. Thomas, V.I., we had an "all american" center from Georgia Tech come aboard as an Ensign. One day he told us that he was going to get us in shape by running up a mountain which turned out to be nothing but a high hill with the center cut out to catch the rain water. Now, the crew aboard the USS R-15 were already in good shape—swimming, running on the beach, and playing softball, volleyball, and horseshoes—so I told Ensign Wright that he was going to be the last to reach the top—and he was. He then admitted that we were already in pretty good shape.

In May 1941 we were in Panama watching a Jap ship go by hauling scrap iron to Japan. I said to my skipper that next they will be shooting it back at us and he replied in the affirmative.

I could write a book about the "R" Boats but it would take too long. My friend Jim Sterling did. He called it "Wake Of The Wahoo". Jim was a yeoman aboard Wahoo with Morton and Kane until her final patrol. He and I broke from the WWII SubVets San Diego Chapter in the mid 60's and started the Ventura County Chapter where I'm a life member. We were the first presidents of the Ventura Chapter and built it up to 53 members. Jim later move to Kingman, AZ and then to the Navy Home in Gulfport, MS where he died a few years ago.

I was in New London when President Roosevelt came to inspect the troops and subs down at the pier. We stood in the hot sun about an hour waiting for him. In 1945 I was in San Diego, at a bar on Broadway, waiting to go on leave from Pearl Harbor when they announced his death.

After 33 days leave, I returned to Pearl and Finback. When the war ended we were getting rockets put on our deck fore and aft and were in our second week of trials. Barb was already fitted and on patrol. We were to be the 2nd one.

In a earlier Newsletter article you stated that you were not sure if I put Barb in commission—I didn't. I did overhaul both Barb and Snook in Midway. The Snook officers wanted me to go to sea with them but, I said that I wasn't ready to go back out yet.

One time Frank Leahy, the coach of Notre Dame came to Midway. He stopped to watch me, **Bill Vangen**, the **Koci brothers**, and other BANG shipmates play football. Bill played fullback for him before getting drafted out of college. I was kicking the ball 65-70 yards and coach Leahy asked if I was the punter on my football team in Nebraska. I replied "no" that my friend did the punting because he could place them out around the 5 or 10 yard line. Coach then said that the war was not going to last too long and he was going to take me and Bill Vangen back to Notre Dame to play football.

I last seen Bill up in Garden Grove, CA — close to my cousin's place. He and coach Leahy were advertising for Schlitz Brewery. Bill and I would write to each other a few times a year. Then I got word from his wife that he died. The last time that I have seen her was when I went to the Las Vegas convention at the Riviera Hotel.

I still have the bronze plaque of USS BANG on my wall that an admiral gave to me while attending the Bang Gang reunion at the Grant Hotel in San Diego. I got it for being the oldest shipmate in attendance. **Earl Bronson** is older than me but he wasn't there. I think he joined the Navy in 1936 and made war patrols on Plunger before putting BANG in commission as Engineering Officer.



Later six of us rented a car and drove to Warner Springs, CA to visit with Earl. Last time I saw him. He died the next year or two. A great guy!

I also lost some of my oilers and assistants like 'Knobby' Ferris, Ralph Knight, and others.

I was planning to try to make both the WWII National in Laughlin, NV and the Bang Ganger in Albuquerque but was too broke at the time. With the cost of a room at \$99.00 in New Mexico, I wasn't too sure. But, at \$20.00 in Laughlin, I would have been good for a night. Sorry I didn't make it as I was hoping to see more of the Bang Gang.

I am enclosing my change of address and a check for the Slush Fund and the very good Newsletter that you put out. I enjoy re-reading them. Last night I read the note that **Mona Knight** sent in about hearing from me at Xmas time with a card and note. I did write to Ralph a lot. Also, to **Bob Jutstrom** and **Ed Kracker** too. I really enjoyed the long news article about **Joe Hutchins**. He was in the other engine room with **Pete Holman**.

I counted 84 deaths in the last Polaris magazine I received. One BANG and two Finback men I served with.

Take care and wish everyone a Merry Xmas and Happy Holiday too.".... Lloyd, thank you for the fine

synopsis of your times aboard the 'R' Boats. Maybe not wooden ships but definitely iron men. I had the honor of meeting Forest (Jim) Stering at a dinner we gave honoring the SubVets in the Gulfport Navy Home. Our talk was brief but I was able to let him know how much I enjoyed his book. Stay well shipmate and keep in touch as we may have a Reunion in your 'backyard' soon.

**Gerald Lagestee**, an ElectriciansMate (61-62), "I got the latest issue of the Newsletter today. You do a good job with it and thanks for including my 'Biography After Bang', as I call it.

Still no word on when my surgery will be performed—all I can say is 'all ahead flank'. My divorce is traveling along at 'dead slow turns'. If I could put some gilly in the gas tank I would do it in a heartbeat.

While I was on Catfish, the electricians were told to order 5 gallons of gilly for cleaning motors, generators, controllers, and the cubicle. The unit of issue was 5 gallons and since we had ordered 5, we received 25 gallons. Needless to say we were ecstatic when it arrived. We used some of it to prime ourselves before heading to the Horse and Cow, a bar that catered to smoke boat sailors in San Francisco. It later moved to Vallejo and is now in Bremerton, WA." ....Jerry, I'm glad to hear that you decided to ignore the mistake in the gilly order. Can you imagine the paper work involved in trying to return 20 gallons of gilly??? You probably saved half a forest. I'll drink to that!

**Bill VonDerLieth**, an IC Electrician (52-57, ComCrew3), "I wish to thank all for your rememberance of Margie, she had a real rough past two years. Last October she had a bad stroke and we almost lost her. We knew that the next stroke could do her in, which it did.

I had to put Sierra down. She had bone cancer in her shoulder and foreleg. She was in too much pain. I hated to do it...we had been together for over 12 years and she was the best of the best. She is buried on the hill behind the house in Portola. It is a great loss to me, personally. It sort of puts a cap on

this year's bad summer. I miss her tremendously. Well, I got down off the mountain 9/20. I am now at my daughter's in Portola for the winter. I plan to return to Rochester in April to finish packing, put the house up for sale, then move out here. I pulled another boo-boo before I left the lake - I tried to drive my truck with my walking boot on, and I sideswiped a tree.....tore off mirror and caved in the door on passenger side. This has really been quite the summer. I sure hope that I have used up my allotment of bad luck for this year. It is supposed to come in threes, but I have exceeded that. (1) Frostbite in all ten toes, (2) split left temple running into shelf, (3) broke heel into four pieces, (4) lost Sierra, and (5) damaged truck. Workman's Comp also denied my claim for the broken heel.....that is not over vet. I will get a lawver if necessary.

Nights are getting colder, but the days are beautiful. I'm getting settled in slowly.

I did buy a 24' truck for moving. It was cheaper to buy this truck than rent a 16' one. After the move is done, I will sell it and probably get more than I paid for it. I got a real deal at only \$3500. It's a diesel, all new tires, 3 new batteries, hydraulic tailgate, has a little bit of rust, and the driver's seat needs replacing. I am getting around much better now. The walking boot has helped tremendously. I am now trying to wean myself from the boot. I can manage for an hour or two, then I have to get back into the boot. Still some aches and pain, but nothing compared to what it was. The surgeon is pleased with my progress....especially at my age. (26)

Hopefully, there will be no more incidents to report." ....Yes indeed, Richard. 2006 has definitely been a bad year for you personally and also for the 'Gang' with its loss of shipmates. Lets pray that 2007 will be better for all of us.


