
Editor's Notes and Ramble: Hi Shipmates!

Bill Fenton and **John Regish** sent me notification of **Ed Lawler's** death. Ed served aboard BANG



with John and I and also served on other Boats during WWII.

CHESTERFIELD, MA - Edwin Lawler died Saturday with his wife Sylvia by his side, after suffering from a stroke. He was 88.

Born April 18, 1922 in Lynn, he was the twin brother of Elwin Lawler and brother of Joseph C. Lawler Jr., Marjorie Conn and Irene Lawler, all of whom

predeceased him. He grew up in Lynn and attended Lynn High School.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy as soon as World War II began. He served 20 years in submarine service, mostly in the Pacific.

When the war ended, he came home and married his high school sweetheart, Sylvia Osgood of Lynn, on Oct. 6, 1945. They recently celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary, surrounded by family.

While in the Navy Ed learned the electrician's trade and attained the status of chief electrician. He went on to create Lawler Electrical Company and continued working as an electrician throughout his life.

Ed and Sylvia raised three children - Elwin, Donald and Joanne - while moving every few years for Ed's sub service. The family lived in New Hampshire, Connecticut, Hawaii, California, and eventually settled in Westhampton, where Ed became a game warden for the Massachusetts Department of Natural Resources.

One can fairly state that Ed Lawler "never saw an animal that he didn't like." As game warden from 1962 to 1987, the Lawlers' home became a refuge for sick and injured animals, including ferrets, fawns, bear cubs, baby wolves, and most frequently raccoons.

After their children had grown, Ed built a home for himself and Sylvia in Chesterfield. It was here that Ed enjoyed farming and haying for decades, involving family, friends and neighbors in the wonderful haying process. For many, many years, the Lawlers shared their home and land with dogs (Annie, Betsy and Daisy), numerous cats, a herd of cows, a flock of Canada geese, ducks, chickens and of course, families of raccoons.

Ed dedicated himself to his community in Chesterfield, serving as selectman for 15 years and also working as town assessor and veterans agent. He made a lot of friends simply by being a nice man who would give you the shirt off his back if you needed it. He lived a lifetime of service. Ed Lawler served his country, his state, his town, and most importantly, was a dedicated family man and wonderful friend.

Ed is survived by Sylvia, his beloved wife of 65 years; his daughter Joanne and son-in-law Frank Antonelli of Dunstable; his son, Elwin Lawler of Fairbanks, Alaska, several grandchildren, including Emily Antonelli and her husband, Jim Ray, of Groton; Peter Antonelli of San Francisco; Jerilyn Lawler and Heather Lawler of Oradell, N.J.; great-grandchildren Olivia and Jack Ray, John Ewell and Griffin Seuss; his niece, Susan Lawler of Weymouth; nephews Joseph C. Lawler III and his wife, Norinne Lawler; William Lawler and his wife Trudy of Hooksett, N.H. and sister-in-law Patricia Lawler of Duxbury. His son, Donald Emerson Lawler, predeceased him in 1973.


Memorial service was held at 10 a.m. on Wednesday at the Chesterfield Congregational Church, with burial immediately following at Bofat Cemetery.



next to him was none other than RMC (SS) Walter Friess. Later that afternoon, as we sat together talking about old times, laughing, telling sea stories, and catching up on living, BANG's last Chief of the Boat, EMC (SS) Leo Gibson, joined us. What a kick it was to have all of us together with the rest of the crewmembers from '68 to '72. When the evening of the banquet came, I had been with 18 of the guys I sailed with. We found out that evening that two of our group planned on coming but could not make it due to illness. They were LT Martin Wilson and CS2 (SS) John Monroe. In all honesty, I am truly thankful for my friends and shipmates that have ventured along life's path with me. They were there when I truly needed them. They asked for nothing and expected nothing but my smile and friendship in return. That is the way it should be between friends. That is the way it is with me. So when I meet a friend or shipmate from the past and we reunite, it is totally gratifying. There is happiness and satisfaction in the fact that we remember each other and care about each other to take the time to say hello and spend some time together, no matter how short that time is. I hope you know, understand and agree with what I mean.

All of us, who attend the reunion, realize that time marches on. It is indefinite. The list of those BANG sailors venturing onto calm seas and fair winds seems to be growing with each subsequent year. It is my wish and my respectful request that you, please, take the time and consider joining us in Pensacola next year. There is no better reason than to be with old friends and shipmates, as well as meeting and making new friends. After all, it is pure joy to see their faces and their smiles when they recognize you from so many years ago."
