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





Editor's Notes and Ramble: Hi Shipmates!

The following email and obituary is an update from Kurt Cadenhead on his father **Al Cadenhead's** sudden death.



"My Dads funeral was very moving. They had a USN flag flying out side the funeral home in my Dads honor and his coffin was between the Stars and Strips and the USN flag. He was wearing his VFW uniform with his Dolphins and ribbons on his jacket. My brother Peter put the piece of teak from the Bang under his

lapel right next to his heart and in his right hand was his grandson's maroon 82nd Airborne beret. His funeral procession was under a police escort and at the cemetery there was a USN honor guard. The flag that draped his coffin was the same flag that draped his Father's coffin. The young Ensign and Chief folded her smartly and handed it to Peter and I.

I miss him terribly but I am so grateful for the 55 years I had with him. And, I am also extremely grateful for the time we got to spend together at the many reunions we went to.

I was able to watch the video of you guys singing my Dads song and I am deeply touched. You Sailors are something else!! There are no words to describe my feelings for "The Gang". You are all very special to me.

I also want to thank you for sending me the copy of **Jim Warden's Diary**. What an absolute treasure it is. What makes it extra special to me is that I know my Dad was in close proximity to where Mr Warden was as my Dad's battle stations were either in the Con or in the Control Room. I have previously read BANG's six official war patrols over and over trying to get a feel of what my Dad and his shipmates went through. Warden's diary puts me right there with his first hand account. I know my Dad would have enjoyed reading it also.

Please thank **Sue Groh** for me for her efforts have helped clarify just what her Father and my Dad went through aboard BANG during WWII."

<u>CADENHEAD</u> <u>Albert</u> <u>Eugene</u>, 89, formerly of Northford, passed away on September 7, 2016, at the Veterans' Hospital in White River Junction, Vermont. He was the beloved husband of the late Marion (Cewe) Cadenhead for 59 years.

Al was born in Quanah, Texas on May 8, 1927 to the late Albert G. and Velma (Wilkerson) Cadenhead. Al was a World War II veteran. He served in the Navy on the submarine USS Bang (SS-385) and was aboard for War Patrols 3-4-5-6. He qualified in submarines in 1945, was awarded the Submarine Combat pin with 2 stars and was a S1c(QM/SS) when released by the Navy. He was a member of the U.S. Sub Vets of WWII. Al was a proud past Commander of the North Branford VFW Post 8294. After the war, he settled in Northford, and lived there from 1963 to 2009. He worked for Pratt and Whitney in North Haven for over 20 years as a maintenance mechanic. Al was a supernumerary

maintenance mechanic. At was a supernumerary police officer in West Haven for 10 years. Al was a true family man, and a proud American. He will be truly missed. He is survived by his two sons: Kurt (Vivian) Cadenhead of Hebron, CT and Peter (Nancy) Cadenhead of New Hampshire. He is also survived by his five grandchildren: Peter Daniel and Emily Colby Cadenhead, both of Newport, NH; Paul and William Cadenhead of Hebron, and Nathan Cadenhead of Granby.

A mass of Christian burial was celebrated at St. Monica Church, on Monday, September 19, 2016. Burial followed at St. Lawrence Cemetery in West Haven. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to the American Disabled Veterans.

Al joined the Navy in 1943 and after boot camp he reported to USS Bunker Hill (CV-17) where he saw action in the Pacific. He then volunteered for Submarines and was assigned to BANG on August 25, 1944 from CSD 42 Relief Crew - two days before she was to depart Pearl Harbor on her 3rd Patrol. Al stayed aboard BANG performing Quartermaster duties for her 4th, 5th, and 6th War Patrols as well. Al then rode BANG back to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard for repairs and eventually transferred to Sub Base New London on August 31, 1945.

He was honorably discharged from the Navy in October of 1947. Besides the submarine Qualification Pin and Patrol Pin with 2 stars, Al was also the recipient of the Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

He talked about life on a sub when ever someone would ask. He said it was an adventure he will never forget. I too was in the navy but could not fathom being out to sea for so long so I served 5 years active duty in the Seabees. Still saw the world but by plane."



"Marshall Lee Fischer 74 year old resident of Onamia, MN passed awav peacefully on February 22, 2016 in Los Fresnos, TX. He was born on November 24, 1941 to Rudolph and Helen (Opp) Fischer. On June 30, 1959 Marshall enlisted in the United State Navy. He received a Honorable Discharge

from active service on December 6, 1962.

On January 17, 1980 he was united in marriage to Dianne Neutgens in Chanhassen, MN. The couple lived in rural Chaska until 1990 when they moved to their lake home on Mille Lacs Lake. Marshall enjoyed the company of family and friends especially taking them out on boat rides on Lake Milacs. He was an avid vegetable gardener and liked fishing Milacs. The last couple years while in Texas, he would roll up his pants and walk into the ocean and try his luck at catching the big one. He also liked woodworking and was always reading woodworking magazines-looking for projects. In November he went deer hunting with his close friends. He was a proud member of the vets club in Onamia and liked meeting up with friends at Harley's bar in Texas.

Funeral Services were held March 5, 2016 at Bethany Lutheran Church-Onamia, MN 56359. Interment will be in Foster Cemetery. Marshall is survived by his sons, David (Jean) Fischer, Jim (Karne) Fischer, Mike Fischer, Marsh (Lizbeth) Fischer, Doug Fischer; step-daughter, Lynn (Jason) Wright; 8 grandchildren; 2 great-grandchildren; and many loving family members and dear friends. He was preceded in death by his wife, Diane; and his parents."

Marshall was received aboard BANG from the New London Sub Base on October 14,1960 and transferred to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard on November 26, 1962. While aboard BANG, Marshall was promoted to Sonarman 3rd Class.

Died twice and brought back twice - two operations in two days. He says it will take some time to mend but the alternative sucks! Hi to all...

Shortly after returning to FL after our Reunion in Chattanooga, I was pleasantly surprised with a phone call from a BANG galley shipmate of mine, **Joe (Frenchy) LaTorre, CS3 (55-58).** I hadn't seen Joe since we said our 'Good-byes' in 1958 as he departed BANG for the Sub Base. So, we set up a time to meet and spent an enjoyable couple of hours getting to know each other again.

During our conversation, I learned that Joe recently lost Violet, his wife of 60+ years. She passed away last spring from **Mesothelioma**. In his search to find out how Violet came in contact with **asbestos fibers**, Joe found out that her contact most likely was from washing the work clothes he brought home. Something like getting cancer from secondary smoke and not actually smoking the tobacco.

Approximately one-third of all mesothelioma cases have been shown to involve U.S. Navy or shipyard exposures and existing documented cases of secondhand asbestos exposure. Joe thought that there might be other shipmates and family members diagnosed with Mesothelioma who are unaware that they may be entitled to compensation. He therefore offers the following name and number of a person who might be able to assist you with any questions you may have about this subject.

New Navy Submarine Work Day

The 18-hour day is dead and gone in the submarine force, and junior officers who were on the front lines for the change say the change has been a revolution for morale and alertness throughout the force.

The submarine force began transitioning in 2014 from an 18-hour day, where sailors stood watch six hours and had 12 hours off for other duties and sleep. Five junior officers speaking on a panel at the Naval Submarine League's annual symposium all agreed that the change to eight-hour watches with 16 hours off had an immediate positive affect.

"It has had an extraordinary impact on a couple of areas," said Lt. Travis Nicks, who was on a fast-attack boat when his ship switched to 8-on, 16-off watches. "Mission execution and alertness. I did one deployment with six hour watches and one deployment with eight hour watches. And on the eight hour deployment, nobody fell asleep as the contact manager standing up. The officer of the deck wasn't leaning up against the scope with both eyes closed and being slapped by the junior officer of the deck to stay awake. I know that sounds like whining to everyone in this room who went their whole career on six-hour watches but I wish you'd had the experience of eight-hour watches because it's life-changing," Nicks said. "The impact was also immediately apparent for crew morale", he added.

"The second part is it dramatically improves morale on the ship," he said. "When guys are sleeping, I noticed immediately that guys are complaining less. They need fewer bathroom They're dipping less breaks. tobacco. Everything gets better with eight-hour watches." Experts such as Nita Shattuck, an associate professor at the Naval Postgraduate School, have argued for years that even without sunlight the body works best on a 24-hour clock and that the 18-hour day led to chronic sleep deprivation among sailors which has led to accidents over the years. In 2013, the heads of the Surface Navy released a statement saying that their force should also make a priority out of sleep.


"The aviation community has long embraced the concept of crew rest as a foundation for safe operations," said Vice Adm. Tom Copeman, then head of Naval Surface Forces, and Rear Adm. David Thomas, then head of Naval Surface Force Atlantic. "It has a place in the surface force, as well."

For Lt. Jessica Wilcox, who served on the ballistic missile sub Wyoming, the benefits of sticking to a 24-hour clock underwater were written on her sailors' faces. "We implemented them on my last patrol and it was a godsend," she said. "Mostly the way I saw it was in my [engineers] and the bags that they didn't have under their eyes anymore." 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




