Robert Calhoun Ware, Sr., age 72, of Dublin, GA died Saturday, July 29, 2017. Mr. Ware was born on February 28, 1945 in Toombs County and was preceded in death by his parents, Woodrow Wilson Ware, Sr. and Frankie Calhoun Ware, and his son, Robby Ware.

He was a veteran of the United States Navy

Submarine Service where he served on the USS Tusk. He was retired from Triple C Trucking, Wrightsville, and was of the Baptist faith.



**Boyd Cohenour** became a member of BANG's 3rd commissioning crew on 10/04/1952 and served aboard as an EN until his transfer to Atomic Energy School, Schenectady NY on 6/16/1955 and later to USS Nautilus (SSN571).

Boyd Wayne Cohenour,

89, of Westerly, RI and Palm Harbor, FL passed away peacefully on Sunday, July 30, 2017, surrounded in love by his immediate family at his RI home.

Born to Clyde and Myrle Cohenour on June 23, 1928, in Liberal, Kansas, Boyd was one of 15 children. The family were

corn farmers who survived the great dust bowl of the 1930's, but lost the farm as a result and relocated to Burlington, IA.

In 1946, at the age of 17, Boyd joined the US Navy and served his country for 20 years. He was a proud crew member of the USS Nautilus, the world's first nuclear powered submarine, and made the historic and heroic voyage under the polar ice cap in 1958. He and his crewmates were lauded for this epic accomplishment with a grand parade in New York City upon their safe return. His travels with the Navy took him all around the world. Boyd retired from the Navy as a Chief Petty Officer in 1966.

Boyd's second career was spent as a production supervisor for Chesebrough-Ponds in Clinton, CT. The jobs he loved and excelled at most, however, were husband and father. He married the love of his life, Gloria Ann Davino on May 31, 1953. Their marriage was to last for 64 years, during which they raised three children, Jocelyn, Jody and Jason.

Always a supportive father, Boyd became a huge fan of St. Bernard's High School wrestling team in the late 70's. Legendary for being the loudest fan in the gym, he was voted #1 fan of the team in 1981. In recent years, he became an ardent and vocal fan of the UCONN Women Huskies Basketball team.

Boyd is survived by his wife, Gloria; daughters Jocelyn McElveen and Jody Cohenour; son Jason Cohenour and wife Dana; grandchildren Jack Cohenour, Courtney Hyland and her husband, Matt; sister Leota Kisler and brother Walden Cohenour.

A memorial service was held at the Curlew Hills Memorial Gardens in Palm Harbor, FL.

#### **Cold War Recognition Certificate**

(How To Obtain)

If you served honorably on active duty, the Guard, Reserve, or as a DOD federal employee from Sept 2, 1945 to Dec 26, 1991, you are authorized the Cold War Recognition Certificate [as per section 1084 of the Fiscal Year 1998 National Defense Authorization Act]. Here's how to obtain your copy free:

1. You will need proof of your service, such as a DD Form 214 (Record of Military Service), WD AGO Form 53-55 (War Department Separation Document); or Oath of Office -- Military Personnel or Letter of Appointment.

2. Qualifying civilian service also can be proved with a Standard Form 50 (Notification of Personnel Action); Standard Form 2809 (Health Benefit Registration Form); an award certificate with employee's name, name of service or agency, and dates; or retirement forms with the employee's name, service or agency and dates.

3. Prepare, date, and sign a letter, requesting the award of the Cold War Recognition Certificate.

Send the letter or request form, and a copy of your service proof to: **Commander**, **USAHRC** 

#### ATTN: AHRC-PDP-A, Dept 480 1600 Spearhead Division Avenue Fort Knox, KY 40122-5408

Your letter must contain the phrase **"I certify that my** service was honorable and faithful" whether as a member of the U.S. armed forces or as a federal civilian employee during the Cold War era, or it will be rejected.

Do not send the original of your proof of service. Send a copy. Original documentation will not be returned.

There is a large demand for this program. Individuals normally will receive a response within 60 days; however, the turnaround time will depend upon the amount of requests received.

Their is lot more to New Orleans than just Bourbon Street! Just mention <u>USS Bang Reunion</u> at time of room reservation. Any reservations made after the cutoff date will be provided at the group rate on a space available basis. So, now is the time to get New Orleans off your bucket list. Call the hotel at (888) 858-6652 and make your room reservations TODAY!

To help you decide your mode of travel to New Orleans, the Troubadour has valet parking only at \$39 per day. Recommended parking is at H.E.A.L. Garage, 300 Lasalle St for \$31.99 for all four days (1-504-522-5128). This facility does NOT allow in/out privileges so you CANNOT enter and exit more than once during the four days. P351 Garage, 275 Lasalle St offers unlimited in/out parking at \$72 for four days (1-504-565-5546). Both garages are less than 1/2 mile from the hotel.

There is an AMTRACK Train Station and a Greyhound Bus Terminal less than a mile from the hotel and Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport (MSY) is approximately 15 miles from the hotel.

**Tuesday Tours** have a **12:30 PM start** with our first stop being **The National WWII Museum**, now the toprated tourist destination in New Orleans. It tells the story through modern technology of the American Experience in the war that changed the world - why it was fought, how it was won, and what it means today - so that all generations will understand the price of freedom and be inspired by what they learn.

If you missed lunch before the tour began, then you might want stop at the American Sector Restaurant & Bar (located in the museum) before continuing on to Mardi Gras World. It serves a unique Victory Garden-to-Table menu inspired by both regional and Southern favorites. There is also a Soda Shop there for lighter fare. **Mardi Gras World** offers a behind the scenes look at New Orleans Mardi Gras traditions. Take the tour to see the year-long float building process.
